
Dear NoB Subscribers,

We are excited to share with you the Autumn 2020 issue of the **North of Byzantium Newsletter**, in which you will find updates about upcoming NoB initiatives, publications, events, and resources.

New NoB Initiative

Mapping Eastern Europe is a new interactive website that will be launched later this year intended to promote research on and teaching of Eastern Europe between the thirteenth and seventeenth centuries. The project gathers a multitude of scholars, both early career and senior, to supply online content in several formats. The historical overviews concisely depict regions and their interactions with neighbors during the period in question, including supplementary political,



economic, military, social, and religious details. The **art historical case studies** focus on the visual and material culture of the regions set against the backdrop of the historical context, as well as introduce methodological and theoretical questions. The short notices about **ongoing research** alert scholars about projects underway. Finally, the **reviews** of recent books and exhibitions enable readers to learn about current scholarship. Via the homepage of *Mapping Eastern Europe*, users who are searching for specific details will be able to access individual pages for each of the main categories of information listed above and filter results according to their interests. Exploratory visitors, instead, can navigate a map of Eastern Europe in the lower half of the opening page, delving into and discovering the variety of sources and materials within.

<u>Mapping Eastern Europe</u> has been made possible thanks to a grant through the "Rapid Response Magic Project of the Princeton University Humanities Council." New NoB Book Series


Eastern European Visual Culture and Byzantium (13th -17th c.) is a new NoB book series that explores the art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of the Balkan Peninsula, the Carpathian Mountains, as well as early-modern Russia and Ruthenia between the thirteenth and seventeenth centuries. We invite proposals for monographs, edited volumes, conference proceedings, and translations in English. All suitable submissions will undergo a double-blind peer review process.

NoB Publications

- We have published a *Thematic Overview* titled "<u>Late Medieval Visual Culture in Eastern Europe</u>" that we wrote for the *Encyclopedia of the Global Middle Ages* (Bloomsbury Academic / Arc Humanities Press, 2020).
- Our first volume <u>Byzantium in Eastern European</u> <u>Visual Culture in the Late Middle Ages</u> appeared with Brill in early August as vol. 65 in the series <u>East Central</u> and <u>Eastern Europe in the Middle Ages</u>, 450-1450. Volume details and abstracts are up on the NoB website, along with a <u>promotional flyer and discount</u> good through the end of December 2020.
- Our volume Eclecticism in Late Medieval Visual Culture at the Crossroad of the Latin, Greek, and Slavic Traditions is under contract with De Gruyter as part of the series Sense, Matter and Medium: New Approaches to Medieval Material and Literary Culture.
- Finally, we are developing a *Handbook of Byzantium* and the *Danube Regions* (13th–16th c.), which will be published with Routledge.

- Our session at the International Medieval Congress, Leeds on the topic "Women and Artistic Production Beyond the Borders of Byzantium" will be resubmitted for the 2022 conference as a double-session. We will recirculate the CFP shortly. If you work on a relevant topic, please be in touch.
- The NoB Lecture we had scheduled at Dumbarton Oaks, for which we had invited **Ivan Drpić** (Associate Professor, University of Pennsylvania) to talk about his current research on gilding in Serbian painting, is rescheduled for March 24. 2022.
