

From Kyivan Rus' to Modern Ukraine: Virtual Conversations on History, Art, and Cultural Heritage



This lecture and conversation series is co-organized in collaboration with <u>Dumbarton Oaks</u> and <u>Connected Central European Worlds</u>, 1500-1700.

Ukraine's history, art, and culture are endangered by the ongoing war. This lecture and conversation series by experts in the fields of history, art history, religion, archaeology, heritage, sociology, as well as museums and conservation, among others, presents the region's rich historical and cultural complexity through its objects, sites, and monuments. A focus on the medieval and early modern periods featuring Greek, Latin, and Slavic contacts, brings to the fore critical evidence to counter modern misrepresentations of Ukraine's history and cultural heritage. 




We have also created an *Advocacy* page on the NoB website. There you will find further <u>bibliography</u> and details about the <u>cultural heritage</u> from Kyivan Rus' and the region of modern Ukraine. We are continually updating these resources and welcome contributions.

Mapping Eastern Europe

Our digital initiative <u>Mapping Eastern Europe</u> has been growing! On the site, users are now able to access 8 historical overviews, 4 thematic overviews, 52 case studies, 2 video case studies, 23 ongoing projects, and 87 book reviews. We feature new entries on the Collegiate Church of the Holy Cross, Wrocław, the stucco templon of the Kokkini Ekklisia in Boulgareli (Epiros), a historical overview of Silesia and much more. We are also adding a new thematic group centering on Endangered Cultural Heritage. The first entry focuses on Mateič Monastery.

We have received new support from the Mary Jaharis Center for Byzantine Art and



<u>Culture</u> to sponsor specific content related to Byzantium. More than 25 entries will be uploaded in the coming months! We are also excited to announce that we have received support from Tufts University to develop new entry types and commission new content.

In the works

- We are developing a *Handbook of Byzantium and the Danube Regions (13th–16th c.)*, which will be published with Routledge. This collection of essays covering history, archaeology, literature, art history, architecture, material culture, and theology examines the visual and cultural production of the Danube regions between local traditions, the Byzantine heritage, and cultural forms adopted from other models, while challenging perceptions of what constitutes Byzantine and post-Byzantine artistic and cultural production.

Eastern European Visual Culture and Byzantium (13th -17th c.) is an NoB book series that explores the art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of the Balkan Peninsula, the Carpathian Mountains, as well as early-modern Russia and Ruthenia between the thirteenth and seventeenth centuries. We invite proposals for monographs, edited volumes, and conference proceedings. We are also interested in translations in English of medieval textual sources and/or of recent publications focusing on the medieval and early modern art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of Eastern Europe.
