
Virtual Lecture and Conversation Series 2022

From Kyivan Rus' to Modern Ukraine: Virtual Conversations on History, Art, and Cultural Heritage


Our virtual lecture and conversation series - co-organized in collaboration with <u>Dumbarton Oaks</u> and <u>Connected Central European Worlds</u>, <u>1500-1700</u> - has been well-attended and well-received from the very beginning. It has been a tremendous opportunity to connect with colleagues from around the world, and especially colleagues from Ukraine, and collaborate to bring to the attention of broader audiences the medieval and early modern history, art, and culture of the region, as well as engage in timely conversations about endangered and displaced cultural heritage.

Dr. Nazar Kozak, a recent speaker in the series, reflected: "Thank you so much for initiating and organizing this important and timely program that fosters rethinking and bringing to light multiple aspects of the past of Ukraine and Eastern Europe. ... I feel indebted to you for a highly needed psychological and organizational support..."

Ukraine's history, art, and culture are threatened by the ongoing war. This lecture and conversation series by experts in the fields of history, art history, religion, archaeology, heritage, sociology, as well as museums and conservation, among others, presents the region's historical and cultural complexity through its objects, sites, and monuments. A focus on the medieval and early modern periods featuring Greek, Latin, and Slavic contacts, brings











Our collaboration with the University of British Columbia is ongoing and after the successful lecture by Michele Bacci, "Conceptualizing the 'Adriatic': Artistic Interactions in Late Medieval Dalmatia," in January 2022, we are now organizing an NoB Lecture and Workshop for March 2023. These two events will tackle the compound visual character of the art and architecture of Eastern Europe, its indebtedness to Byzantine models, and broader theoretical and methodological questions within art history. Medieval Studies, and Byzantine Studies. One key topic will be the role of women as agents of cultural contact, transfer, and adaptation of knowledge in regions of the Balkans and the Carpathians between the thirteenth and sixteenth centuries.

Ongoing:

• We are developing a *Handbook of Byzantium and the Danube Regions (13th–16th c.)*, which will be published with Routledge in 2023. This collection of essays – covering history, archaeology, literature, art history, architecture, material culture, and theology – examines the visual and cultural production of the Danube regions between local traditions, the Byzantine heritage, and cultural forms adopted from other models, while challenging perceptions of what constitutes Byzantine and post-Byzantine artistic and cultural production. We organized a successful three-day closed-doors workshop around the volume in May 2022. We are currently working with our authors and copyeditor to finalize the manuscript and will be submitting it to the press in spring 2023.

Eastern European Visual Culture and Byzantium (13th -17th c.) is an NoB book series that explores the art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of the Balkan Peninsula, the Carpathian Mountains, as well as early-modern Russia and Ruthenia between the thirteenth and seventeenth centuries. We invite proposals for monographs, edited volumes, and conference proceedings. We are also interested in translations in English of medieval textual sources and/or of recent publications focusing on the medieval and early modern art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of Eastern Europe.

All suitable submissions will undergo a double blind peer review process. Please find the book proposal form <u>here</u>.
